

Quartering Act (1765, 1774)

His majesty hereby requires the people to house and quarter the officers and soldiers in barracks provided by the colonies: and if there shall not be sufficient room in these barracks, then in such a chase the soldiers must be quarter in the homes of the people of the colony. They are also required to do the following:

- Provide food for troops
- Provide beer and wine for troops
- Provide bedding, utensils, candles, and firewood


