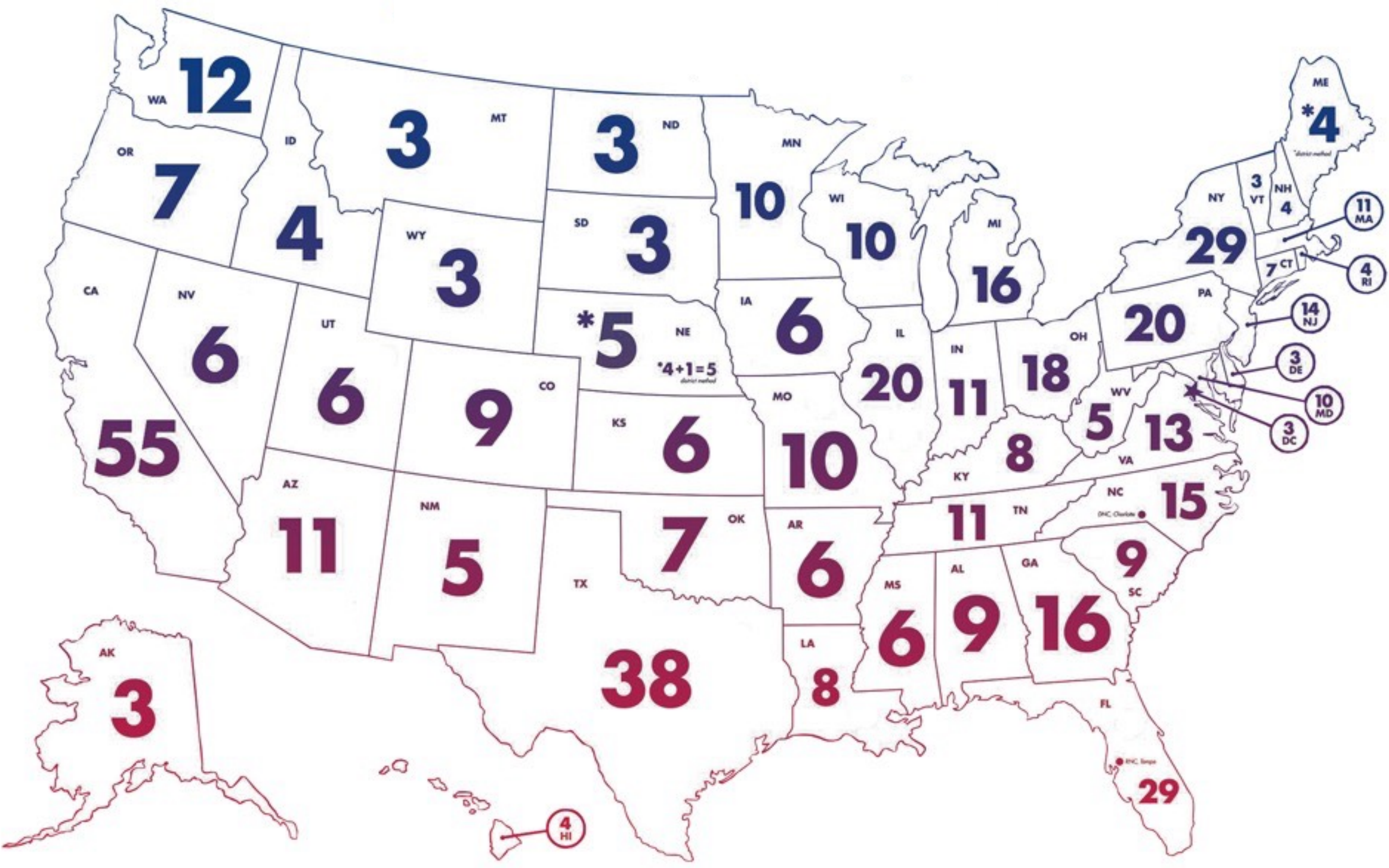

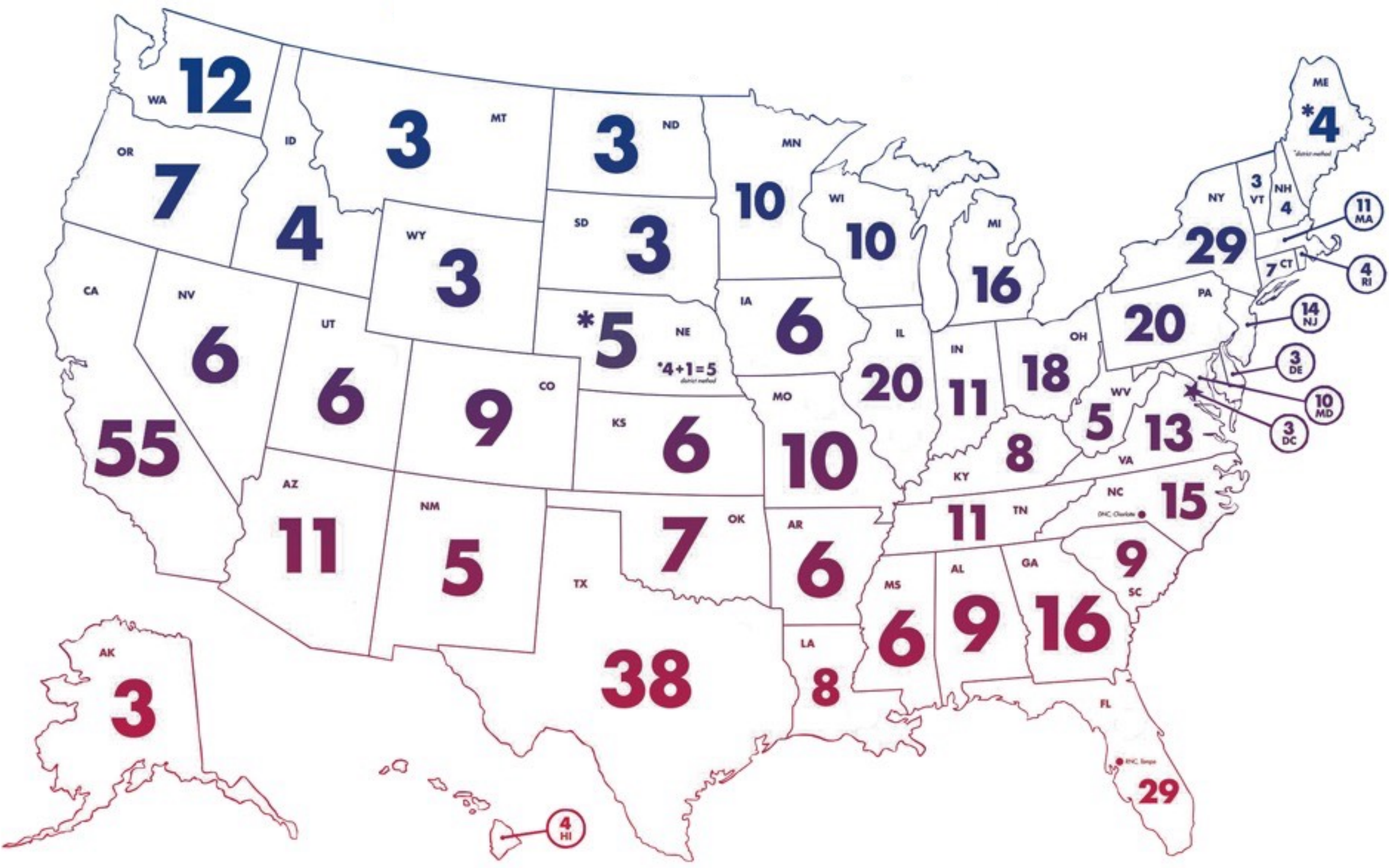

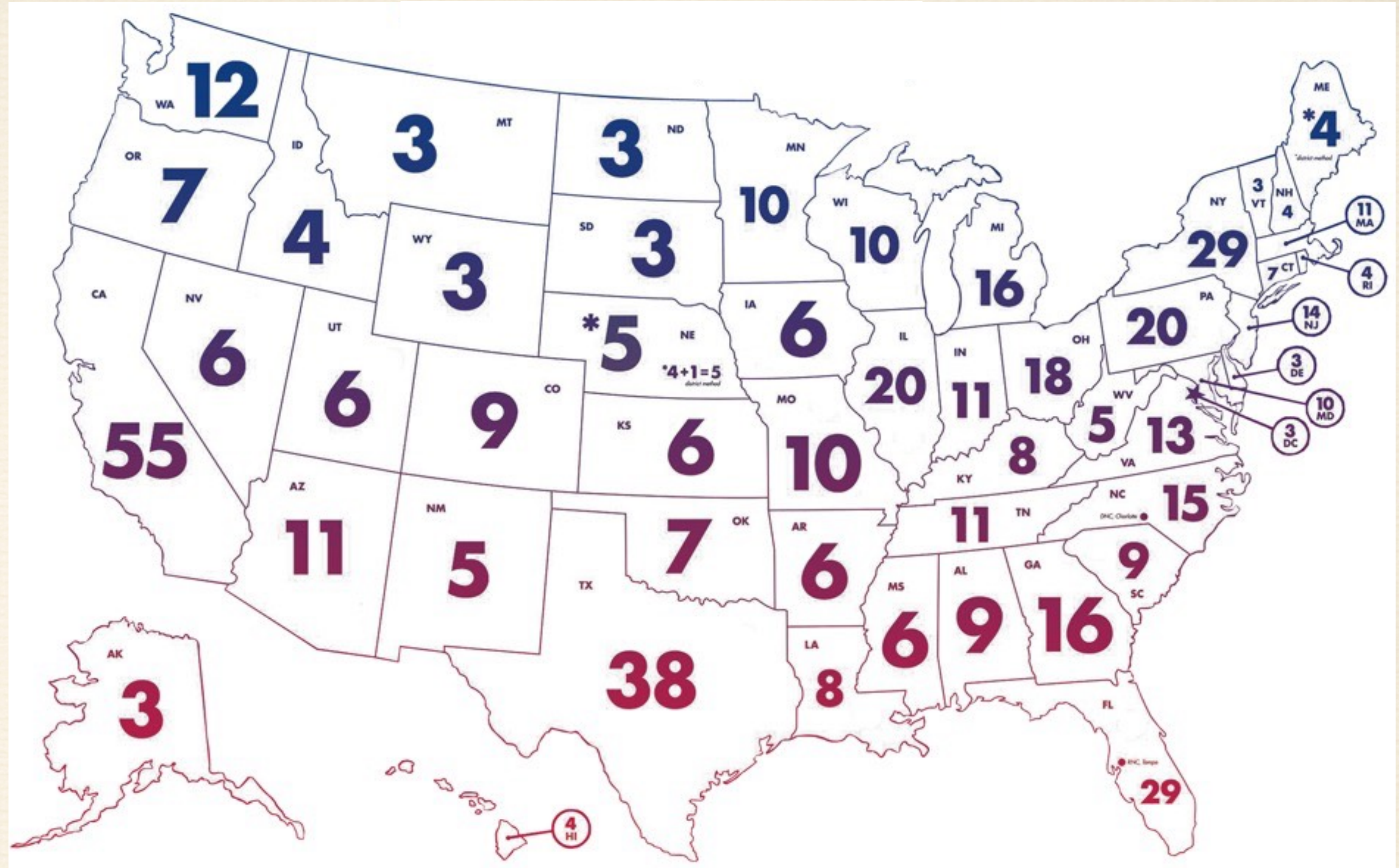

**TO RATIFY

Anti-Federalists

Federalists

- ★ In FAVOR of the Constitution
- ★ Wanted a strong federal government

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OR NOT
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Anti-Federalists

- ★ AGAINST the Constitution
- ★ Wanted a weak federal government that would not threaten states' rights
- ★ Wanted a Bill of Rights to declare and protect the rights of the people

Federalists

- ★ In FAVOR of the Constitution
- ★ Wanted a strong federal government
- ★ Argued that a Bill of Rights was not needed - federal power was already limited.
- ★ Drafted the Federalist Papers in support

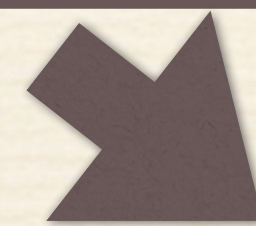
