- Not very effective
 - Fierce rivalry between John C. Calhoun and Martin Van Buren
 - Infighting caused Jackson to turn elsewhere for advice.

IN THE END...

- Jackson & Martin Van Buren support the Eatons
- Cabinet Husbands supported their wives = ineffective!
- A major factor in most of the cabinet resigning in 1831.

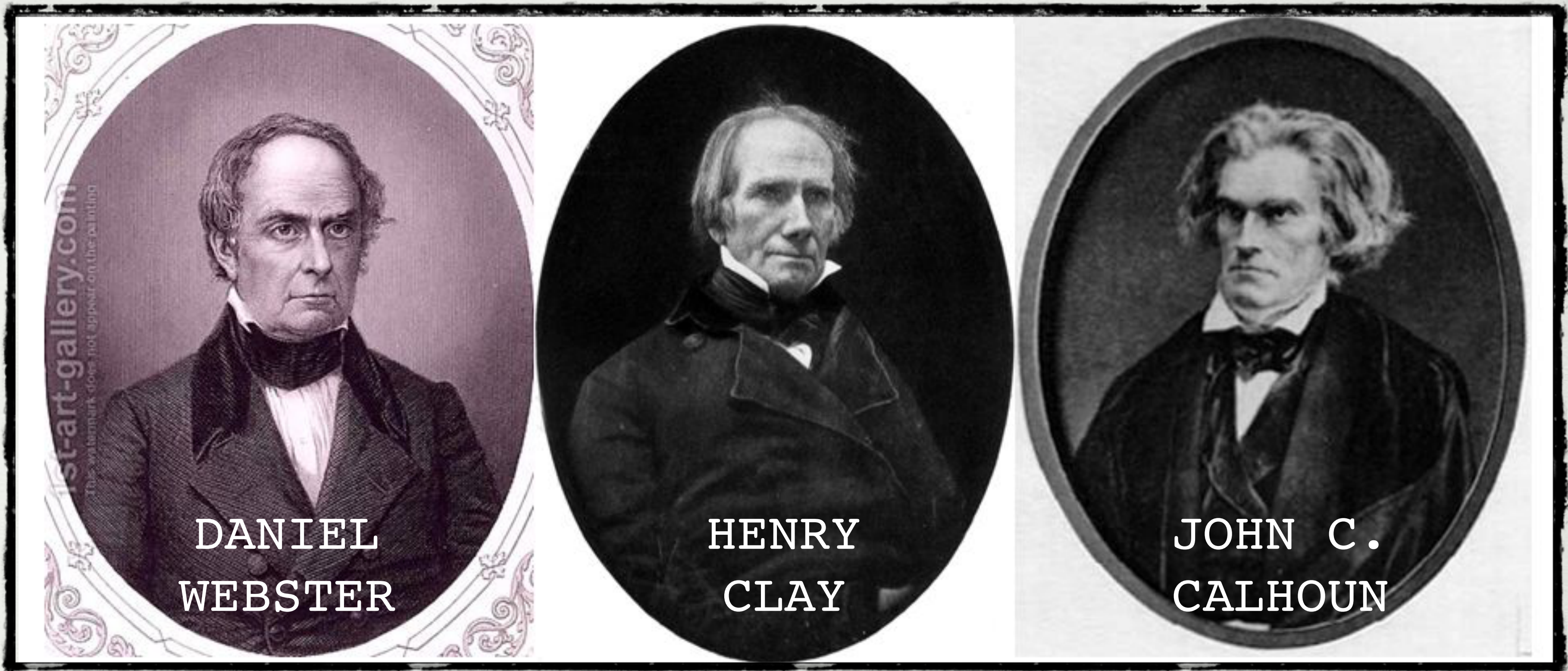

- Term given to unofficial advisors by Jackson's critics
- Jackson preferred their opinions over the Parlor Cabinet
- Made up of a rough group of men, not experienced in politics
 - Mostly newspaper editors, political supporters, and old friends
 - Members: Martin Van Buren*, Francis Preston Blair*, Amos Kendall*, William Lewis, Andrew Jackson Donelson
 - Seen as proof that Jackson was truly a “common man's” president
- Very influential after the Petticoat Affair rocked the Parlor Cabinet
- Credited with making Executive Branch more powerful than ever before.

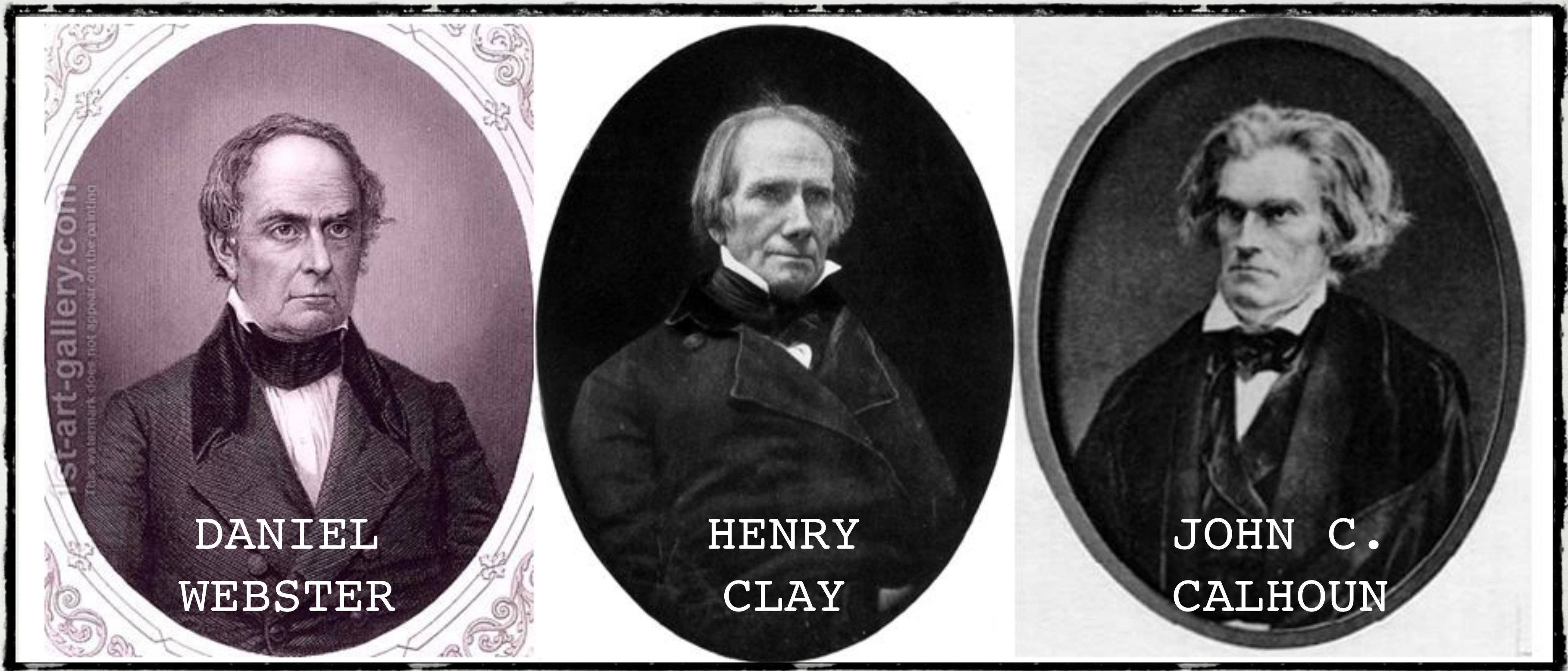
